Many of Grandma Moses' paintings are landscapes showing her favorite memories. She had ten children and often included them in her paintings. "Sugaring Off" is a painting of Grandma Moses' town in the winter. By the way, one nifty fact that we learned is that Grandma Moses didn't start painting until she was seventy-five years old. By the time she died at age 101, Grandma Moses had painted approximately 1,600 paintings, and 250 of those were painted after her hundredth birthday! Wow! This really gives any of us out there that are late bloomers quite a bit of hope!

Next, we made snow globes, and listened to music that was inspired by the Robert Frost poem. We can just imagine what it was like to be Grandma Moses and have a scene in our heads that we want to paint.
